Review of OSHA Standards -- Review of OSH Act, purpose, coverage, and standards; OSHA's authority to inspect.
Elements of an Effective Safety and Health Program - Review what OSHA feels each company should have in place to meet the minimum requirements of having an effective safety and health program.

Inspections, Citations, Penalties, Most Cited Violations -- Priorities fatal accidents/employee complaints; Citations/review of penalties; Appeals process

Subpart I—Personal Protective Equipment -- General Requirements, selection and use, limitations, acceptable use, eye and face protection, head protection, foot protection, electrical protective devices, hand protection.

Subpart D—Walking and Working Surfaces—Selection for floor loading, floor openings, open-sided floors, and platforms, stair, ladders, and scaffolding.

Subpart E—Route of Exit -- Permissible exit components, protective enclosures and arrangement of exits, exterior routes, width/capacity occupant load, fire protection, exits, and emergency action plans.

Hazard Communication -- Scope and application, chemical inventory list, material safety data sheets, labeling, required training, contractor safety non-routine tasks, articles, office supplies, consumer products.

Subpart H—Hazardous Materials Part I -- Scope/purpose and application, definitions, flammable and combustible liquids.

Bloodborne Pathogens -- General requirements, most frequently asked questions concerning OPIM (other potentially infectious materials) standards, contaminated work surfaces, training, medical records.

Subpart O—Machine Guarding I -- Where mechanical hazards occur; hazardous mechanical motions/actions, requirements and methods for safeguards.

Subpart H—Hazardous Materials II & III—Flammable liquids spraying/bonding/grounding, explosion proof wiring Class I-III location/groups/divisions.
